I take the honour to thank you for coming to witness the Launch of the BIOTA East Africa Atlas: Rain forest Change over Time."

This occasion unveils the *BIOTA East Africa Atlas*, *a* tangible product of the research linkages established between Karlsruhe University of Health Sciences and Makerere University within the framework of the BIOTA East Africa Project (Biodiversity Monitoring Transect Analysis of Africa).

This launch is in line with the Makerere University Strategic Plan (2008/09-2018/19) aimed at repositioning the University to meet emerging development challenges. I am delighted to inform you that the researchers and academicians at Makerere University are keen to strengthen this linkage to realize more outputs in research and outreach.

I also thank the partners, in particular the National Forestry Authority (NFA), the Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA), and other field staff who have contributed to the success of the BIOTA as well as other projects in which Makerere University is involved.

I commend Prof. Gertrude Schaab and Sebastien Schwarz (from Karlsruhe University, Germany) and partners in Makerere University (specifically the Faculty of Forestry and Nature Conservation represented by Assoc. Prof. Gerald Eilu) for their effort in producing the atlas.
