Nyabyeya Forestry College welcomes the Vice-Chancellor of Makerere University and the entire team to the College.

Background to Forestry Training at NFC

Technical Forestry in Uganda started in 1932 at Kityerera in Mayuge District, in eastern Uganda, with the training of local forest workers to assist colonial foresters. The Forestry School was unfortunately closed in 1936, due to an outbreak of sleeping sickness. The college was however transferred to the present site and reopened in 1948, to occupy buildings, which had been used by refugees from Poland, who had been displaced by the Second World War.

A two-year formal certificate course in Forestry was started immediately in June 1948, while an in-service diploma programme in Forestry was started in 1952. The 16 months programme was partly tenable in UK at the Dean of Foresters' School Glaucestershire (six months), till 1967 when a revised diploma programme of 18 months, fully tenable at Nyabyeya Forestry College, was put in place.

Current programmes

Since 1948, the college has diversified programmes offered, and enriched the content of traditional programmes, in response to changing dimensions in forest resources management, national forestry training needs and stakeholder demands. Programmes currently offered at this College are indicated in Table 1.

Current students Enrollment
