Research in the health field has continually described disease burdens in communities, but time has come for researchers and health professionals to go beyond their health training, research and service delivery, and translate this wealth of information into something tangible for the community. And I believe the 6th Annual Scientific Conference is the perfect platform to map out strategies on how to achieve this.

I would like to thank the organizers of the conference, the College Administration under Principal, Professor Nelson Sewankambo, and all participants for coming to share your findings with the scientific and general community.
