I commend the strategic partnership of the MEDI-SHARE project, which is an initiative taken by a consortium of institutions: CINENA of University of Bologna, Italy and pharmacy schools in three Higher Education institutions in East Africa; Makerere University, Nairobi University, and Muhimbili University of Health Sciences.

I pay tribute to CINECA, a non-profit Consortium, made up of 37 Italian universities, for joining academic institutions in Africa, Caribbean and Pacific regions in MEDI-SHARE and taking the initiative to pilot IT tools for collection and management of data on HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and malaria.

As Vice Chancellor, I am glad that Makerere University is one of the Universities participating in the MEDI-SHARE project. Makerere University holds a prestigious position in Uganda in its humble contribution to knowledge and research in the region. Makerere has been a centre of many innovative discoveries including the discovery of Prostaglandins by SMM Karim in 1970s. Makerere is associated with the Uganda Cancer Institute where Buckitt's lymphoma was described in 1960s.

The three (3) diseases of your current interest namely HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria have received enormous interest within the body of researchers at Makerere University. The first awareness of a strange disease that was later identified as HIV AIDS was first described in the country by Makerere University personnel in 1982. There is significant research work on Malaria; and a number of collaborative studies on Tuberculosis at the College of Health Sciences as well as research in prevention of mother to child transmission of HIV/AIDS.

In addition, the activities of this consortium are in line with the current Makerere University Strategic Plan (2008/09-2018/19), which emphasizes knowledge transfer partnerships and networking; and internationalization.

I am particularly happy that Makerere can share in the wealth of experience and professionalism coupled with technical expertise in IT solutions to fill the expectations of customers such as Ministry of Health and other national agencies.

I hope that your discussions will pave a way to better manage and promote health management information systems.
