ICT Related Challenges of SMEs in Uganda:

- Inadequate access to affordable access ICT equipment
- Paucity of ICT knowledge
- Need for tailor-made solutions

➔ 17 Internet users per 1,000 people and only 8 out of 1,000 have access to a PC

➔ Tele-density at 17 people to 100 (Dec 2007)



Government's Responds:

- **Creation of a new Ministry for ICT to unify political guidance and regulation**
- **Increased priority of government on ICT**
- **Full liberalisation of telecommunications sector**
- **National Data Transmission Backbone with e-Government Infrastructure established**
- **Policy and legislative framework (Cyber Laws) being established**
- **Rapid growth in ICT training at higher, mid and lower educational institutions (eg. Faculty of Computing and IT, Makerere University has 5,000 students – undergrad/postgrad, schools training, tertiary institutes, etc.)**
- **Investor friendly economic climate (ie. investment incentives)**



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ICT for SME Programme Uganda: A Comprehensive Approach to Development

- Multistakeholder PPP Approach incl. the Gov. of Uganda, Gov. of Austria, Uganda Private Sector, UNIDO and Microsoft
- District Business Information Centres (DBICs)
- PC Refurbishment Centre of Excellence



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The Business Information Centre Model Approach:

- Centers are set-up as a joint venture between public and private sector institutions
- Centers operate on a business plan and offer demand-driven, fee-based services:
 - Entrepreneurial advisory services
 - Business information services
 - ICT training
 - Access to Internet

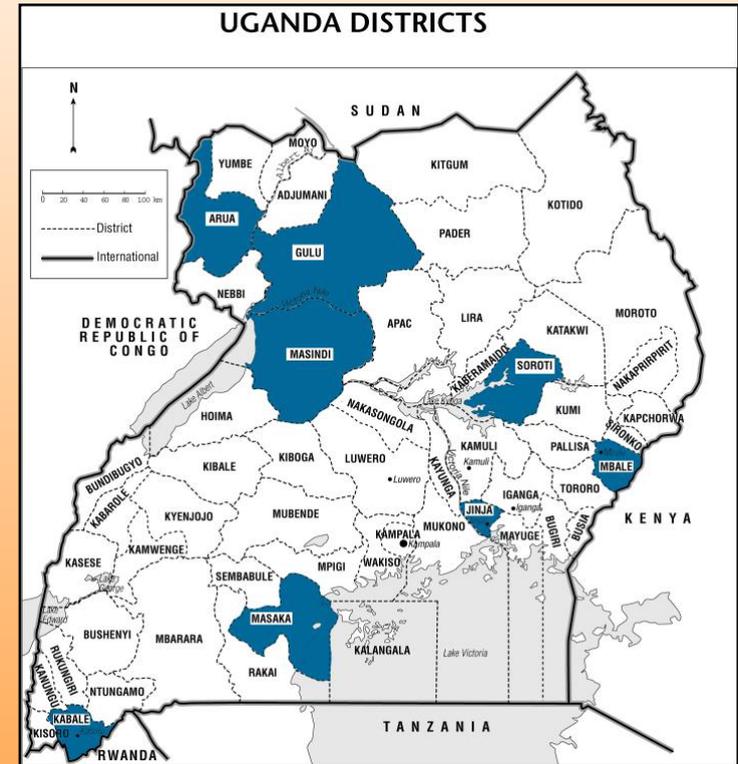


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The Business Information Centre Model Achievements:

- Business Information Centers have been established in eight Districts throughout Uganda
- The Uganda Gov. will establish another 20 centers based on the above model

Challenges:

- Affordable access to quality hardware and software for SMEs

UNIDO – Microsoft Partnership:

- Launch of concept at ICT Best Practice Forum, Ouagadougou 2007
- Scalable pilot programme in Uganda
- Increase outreach and replicate pilot programme based on requests from numerous African countries



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Refurbished computer programme

PC Refurbishment Centre of Excellence, Kampala:

- Market study documents strong demand for PCs
- Local refurbishment – target of 10,000 PCs per annum
- Price per PC = US\$ 175
- Stringent quality criteria
- Warranty and after-sales services
- End-of-life recycling of PCs



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Refurbished computer programme

PC Refurbishment and E-waste management

- Project addresses the entire life cycle of computers
- First comprehensive study on e-waste in Uganda



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The Business Information Centre and PC Refurbishment Model

Lessons learned:

- Strong local ownership
- Collaboration through Public-Private Partnership
- Self-sustainability
- Contingency plan for HR development and retainment
