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50 Students from 6 Countries attend 2012 Academy

In January 2012 the African Gifted Foundation held its second Academy in Kampala, Uganda and it was twice the size of the previous year.

This year 50 students from six countries attended. Botswana, Kenya, Nigeria, South Africa, Uganda and Zanzibar were all represented by an outstanding group of students from a range of backgrounds, all of whom stood out as excellent mathematicians at their respective schools.

Once again the Academy took place at Makerere University, Kampala, Uganda, and was hosted by Dr Mango, Dean of the School of Physical Sciences at Makerere.

Beauty and Elegance in Mathematics

The Academy opened with a fascinating and inspiring lecture delivered by Thomas Hagspihl of St Andrews College, South Africa on "Beauty and Elegance in Mathematics".

Then tutors from the UK ran a series of courses covering the mathematics of financial markets, codes and ciphers and space science.



Dr Nick Motson from Cass Business School, London ran a very popular course on the dynamics of financial markets and banking. This included an online trading game and a trip to the Uganda Securities Exchange.

David Cope from Bletchley Park, the home of the legendary British code breakers once again delivered a fascinating course on codes, ciphers and encryption.

Dr Simon Roberts from University of Nottingham and the UK's Space Academy explored space and put the students' rocket making skills to the test (he won – again!).



Trips, Presentations and Events

A visit to the Uganda Securities Exchange gave the students a chance to observe traders at work and a visit to the huge Kakira Sugar Works amazed them as to what it takes to produce 50% of Uganda's entire sugar needs.

One of the highlights of the week was a series of presentations by young engineers from Tullow Oil. They presented on the oil and gas sector across Africa and talked openly about their own educational journey, careers and challenges as African engineers building

successful careers in a major company on the continent.

Oliver Hire and Alesha White from Czarnikow Group, one of the world's largest commodity trading groups based in the City of London



flew in to share their insights about the global commodities industry. Oliver may also be responsible for introducing the game of rugby to Zanzibar after running an enthusiastic training session and handing the ball to one of the Zanzibari students at the end of the Academy.





A special moment for the Academy was when Ashish Thakkar the MD and Founder of Mara Group, one of Uganda's fastest growing technology companies and charitable groups with over 4,000 employees in 17 countries presented to the students and spoke



about his upcoming flight aboard Virgin Galactic's spacecraft as East Africa's first space traveller!

As well as a chess masterclass, hosted by Harold Wanyaman, East African Chess Champion, there were quizzes, sports

sessions and presentations from students (including some embarrassing dancing from the chairman).

Prize giving

Everyone enjoyed a busy, stimulating week, culminating in a closing ceremony hosted by the Vice Chancellor of Makerere University and attended by local executives, dignitaries and the media.

The final evening saw a number of prizes being awarded to students who stood out during the week. All prizes were provided by Mrs. Jayshree Barnes, a great supporter of AGF.

The highlight of the closing ceremony was the special award provided by Czarnikow Group. This incredible prize is a one week, all expenses paid work experience trip to Czarnikow in London and it was awarded to Ocen Paul of Kako Secondary School, Uganda for his all-round outstanding ability and contribution.

What next?

The AGF team in London, supported by our new administrator Moira Millar, is working on the next Academy which will take place in Ghana in the summer of 2012. This will be our first Academy in West Africa and will be followed by the January 2013 Academy back in East Africa where we are aiming for as many as 75 students from up to 10 countries.
