Yoweri Museveni has promised free and fair elections next year and <u>warned</u> the United States and the United Kingdom against lecturing Uganda on democracy.

A UPDF officer in Gulu on Saturday shot himself dead under unclear circumstances.

Local musician Moses Ssali aka Bebe Cool has <u>sued</u> the Government for sh28m compensation for the injuries he suffered when he was allegedly shot by a Police constable attached to Jinja Road Police Station on January 29.

At least 64 schools had by yesterday been <u>closed</u> by the Education Standards Agency for allegedly defying a ban against holiday teaching.

The government yesterday said allegations by some top Buganda kingdom officials that President Museveni "breached" a gentleman's agreement with the Kabaka after their landmark 2009 September meeting "<u>is incorrect</u>".

A committee set up by Makerere University to restructure the institution's academic programmes has recommended that 31 courses be <u>phased out</u>, 10 be merged while three others be suspended.

Up to \$500 million (Shs 1 trillion) in budget support from the European Union could be withheld if officials implicated in the 2007 CHOGM related impropriety are <u>let off the hook</u>.

Kyambogo University will admit 1,000 more private students, bringing the number this year to 8,000, vicechancellor Prof. Isaiah Omoro Ndiege has announced.

The Chogm investigation committee will this morning meet to adopt the <u>final report</u> that is to be tabled before Parliament tomorrow.

Vice President Gilbert Bukenya is pushing ahead with his bid to <u>unseat NRM secretary general Amama Mbabazi</u>. Prof. Bukenya, according to his close aides.

Makerere University Business School will <u>continue teaching</u> some of the 30 courses dropped by Makerere University, saying the decision was reached in disregard of their recommendations.
