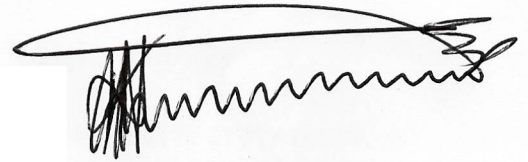
Conclusion
